JOB DESCRIPTION

ROTATIONAL SENIOR CLINICAL FELLOWS IN COMMUNITY PAEDIATRICS, NEURODISABILITY AND NEUROLOGY

An opportunity has arisen for rotational senior clinical fellow posts based at Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust. These posts are aimed at doctors with paediatric experience who are eligible to work at ST4+ / middle grade level. The posts would be rotational for 2 years, with 6-8 month placements in Community Paediatrics, Neurodisability and Neurology and with participation in the on-call rota in Paediatric Medicine.

The posts would offer flexibility in training and a varied clinical experience in a supportive paediatric teaching hospital setting. The roles include attendance at protected teaching/training sessions thereby providing a safe and positive working environment.

Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust

Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust is one of only three dedicated children's hospital trusts in the UK and provides integrated healthcare for children and young people, including community and mental health care as well as acute and specialist services. We see children from 0-16 years in most cases and in some cases up to 18. It provides a full range of services for residents of Sheffield and South Yorkshire as well as specialised services for patients from across the United Kingdom. In 2021/22 we saw 210,439 children in outpatients, 10,732 ward admissions, and over 60,720 in the Emergency Department. Embrace transported nearly 1,975 patients.

Services include allergy, clinical genetics, community paediatrics, endocrinology, gastroenterology, immunology/infectious disease, neurodisability, neurology, metabolic medicine, respiratory, audiology, rheumatology, haematology, oncology and bone marrow transplants. Surgical services include paediatric and neonatal surgery, orthopaedics, neurosurgery and spinal surgery, ENT, plastics, ophthalmology and maxillofacial surgery. Sheffield Children's Hospital is a Major Trauma Centre and a regional burns centre. CAMHS services are based across the city as well as at the Children's Hospital.

There are approximately 150 in-patient beds of which approximately 65 are medical.

Post-graduate Facilities

The Illingworth Library provides facilities for all of the Sheffield based NHS staff and University of Sheffield staff and students. The library is the specialist resource for paediatrics in the Sheffield area. The library is linked to the University and Sheffield Children's Hospital Trust networks, which provide CD-ROM and Internet access to medical resources such as Cochrane Library and Medline. Mediated searches are offered by library staff.

Postgraduate Medical Education

There is a weekly Postgraduate Meeting (Grand Round) on a Thursday. Throughout the week there is a variety of subspecialty departmental meetings and teaching sessions to which all hospital staff are

welcome to attend. Increasingly these meetings are available on Microsoft Teams as well as attending in person.

Whilst this is a non-training post, an educational supervisor will be allocated and appraisal meetings undertaken. We would encourage the development of a personal portfolio, which will include a personal learning plan, and information about experience gained, learning opportunities and evidence of progress. There may be opportunities to gain non-clinical experience in an area tailored to specific interests of the successful candidate, for example research and education, as well as active participation in audit.

The rotations may include the following posts:

SENIOR CLINICAL FELLOW IN COMMUNITY PAEDIATRICS

Job Purpose

This post will provide experience in community paediatrics. The role will be split between the developmental assessment clinic, the continence service and the Children Looked After Service (CLAS). The postholder, with supervision will be involved with assessing and managing children with a range of developmental problems and continence issues as well as completing statutory health assessments for children looked after by the local authority.

3. MAIN DUTIES/RESPONSIBILITIES

Clinical Training Responsibilities

The community paediatric team works alongside the Neurodisability team in providing assessment and management to children with neurodevelopmental disorders as well as providing the continence and the children looked after services (CLAS). The post holder will gain experience in all 3 areas of community paediatrics:

Developmental Assessment Clinic

With supervision the post holder will carry out clinics and learn how to provide assessment and management to children with a range of neurodevelopmental concerns.

Continence Clinic

The successful applicant will provide a weekly continence clinic alongside the specialist nursing team and supervising consultant.

Children Looked After Clinic

The successful applicant will complete statutory health assessments for children looked after by the local authority. They will have the opportunity to learn about the health needs of looked after children and the adoption process.

There will be an induction phase followed by regular supervision throughout the post.

SENIOR CLINICAL FELLOW IN PAEDIATRIC NEURODISABILITY

Job Purpose

This post is ideal for Doctors who wish to develop their skills and gain experience in paediatric neurodisability. The post is based at the Ryegate Children's Centre, which is part of Sheffield Children's NHS Foundation Trust.

Main Duties/ Responsibilities

Clinical Training Responsibilities

The Neurodisability Team is a multidisciplinary group within the Trust providing assessment and management of children with a wide range of neurodevelopmental, learning and behavioural disorders. The successful applicant will gain experience in the assessment and management of neurodevelopmental conditions, including autism, ADHD, cerebral palsy and learning disability, as part of a highly experienced team.

After an induction phase, the successful applicant will deliver clinics and assessments and participate in multidisciplinary team working and teaching.

Regular supervision will be provided by a consultant in the team.

SENIOR CLINICAL FELLOW PAEDIATRIC NEUROLOGY

Job Purpose

This post is ideal for Doctors who wish to develop their skills in paediatric neurology. The post is based at the Ryegate Children's Centre / Sheffield Children's Hospital and involves the many subspecialty fields of neurology (e.g. epilepsy, movement disorders, neuromuscular, neurorehabilitation).

Clinical Training Responsibilities

The Paediatric Neuroscience Unit provides a full range of diagnostic services including 3T MRI, telemetry, and neurophysiology. Experience is available in all areas of acute neurology including: epilepsy, ketogenic diet, VNS, movement disorders, ataxia, tics, neuromuscular disorders, neural tube defects, ITB, acquired brain and spinal neurorehabilitation. The successful applicant will gain experience in the assessment and management of common childhood neurological conditions as part of a highly experienced team.

The successful applicant will be required to provide support to two paediatric neurology clinics per week, gaining training and experience in neurology. They will also participate in ward-based work and teaching on the paediatric neuroscience ward.
